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*Contact numbers for sphere packings*

In discrete geometry, the contact number of a given finite number of non-overlapping spheres was introduced as a generalization of Newton's kissing number. This notion has not only led to interesting mathematics, but has also found applications in the science of self-assembling materials, such as colloidal matter. In this talk, we investigate the problem in general and emphasize important special cases including contact numbers of minimally rigid and totally separable sphere packings. We also discuss the complexity of recognizing contact graphs in a fixed dimension. Moreover, we list some conjectures and open problems. This is a joint work with Muhammad A.
